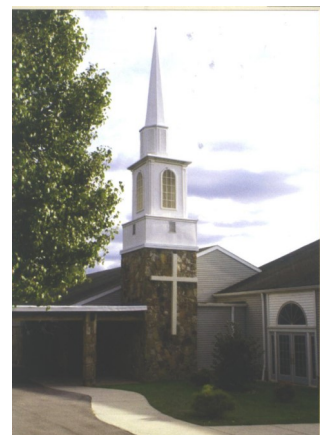

Dear Friends in Christ,

John Muir, born in Dunbar, Scotland, was a farmer, inventor, shepherd, naturalist, explorer, writer, and conservationist. In 1849, when John was age 11, the Muir family emigrated to the United States.

When he was 29 years old, John Muir walked a thousand miles from Indianapolis to the Gulf of Mexico, which included walking through Tennessee.

While in Tennessee on September 12, 1867, John wrote the following in his journal: "Crossed a wide cool stream [the Emory River], a branch of the Clinch River. There is nothing more eloquent in nature than a mountain stream, and this is the first I ever saw. Its banks are luxuriously peopled with rare and lovely flowers and overarching trees, making one of nature's coolest and most hospitable places. Every tree, every flower, every ripple and eddy of this lovely stream seemed solemnly to feel the presence of the great Creator. Lingered in this sanctuary a long time thanking the Lord with all my heart for his goodness and allowing me to enter and enjoy it."

The Emory River that John Muir encountered on his walk, and described in his journal, is located only a one-hour drive from our church, just east of the Catoosa Wildlife

Management Area.

Another John, John the Baptist, lived much of his life in the wilderness, and spent most of his ministry baptizing people outdoors in the Jordan River. Jesus, as well, spent a great deal of his time in the wilderness --- 40 days in the desert, on the Sea of Galilee; and he often went to a mountain top to pray.

The famous Protestant Reformer, Martin Luther, said "God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but on the trees and flowers and clouds and stars."

In most places where Lilly and I have lived previously, we either experienced summers that were long and hot, or winters that were long and cold. I have spent more time outdoors while living in Tennessee than I ever have living anywhere else. Lilly and I absolutely love the four seasons in the Glade!

And when I'm outdoors, I can't help but soak in the sights and sounds of nature that cause me to feel engulfed by the loving presence of our magnificent Creator, much like John Muir did so many years ago.

Friends, I would like to encourage all of us at Community Church to soak in the beauty of nature, whether gardening, hiking, golfing, fishing, playing tennis, pickleball, going for a stroll in the neighborhood, boating, or simply sitting on a porch---let's open our minds and hearts to hear and see God's loving presence in the birds, lakes, mountains, trees, flowers, and rivers.

Memorial Day, originally called "Decoration Day", is a day of remembrance for those who have died in the service of the United States of America. Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It is truly an American Holiday.

The origins can be contributed to General John A Logan, who issued a proclamation on May 5, 1868. The proclamation called for "Decoration Day" to be observed annually and nationwide. General Logan was commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, the veteran's organization for Union Civil War veterans. Logan adopted the Memorial Day practice begun in the Southern states 3 years earlier.

The original Memorial Date was May 30th, but was moved to the last Monday of May by Congress to create a three-day weekend. The original date of May 30th was selected because there had not been a major battle on that day according to official records.

We will commemorate Memorial Day this year on Monday, May 27, 2019 with our Memorial Flag Ceremony. To honor those men and women who have fought and died for your freedoms and liberties by serving in the Armed Forces of The United States of America. We would like to encourage and invite members of our church to join us at 8 AM on Memorial Day, to raise the flags and at 4 PM to lower the flags.

As always the ceremony is pending the weather. Dennis Flynn will be in charge of the ceremony and will make the call if the weather is not conducive.

The numbers above only reflect what has been brought in and spent in March 2019. Please refer to the Balance Sheet posted in the Fellowship Hall to see the Total Church Assets.

PLEASE READ THE NOTES TO FULLY UNDERSTAND THE NUMBERS ABOVE!

- General Fund** is the operating funds to run the Church and consists of General Contributions from Church members. Expenses include Pastoral and Support Staff salaries; administrative costs for supplies; utilities, building and grounds maintenance; and church committees expenditures. The Difference shown in the General Fund is due to: (1) March expenses exceeding March income by \$55.85; (2) the transfer of money from the General Fund to the Mission's Fund to fulfill our quarterly mission's commitment and; (3) the transfer of money from the General Fund to the Strategic Planning Projects that were approved in the 2019 budget. The funds utilized to cover the transfers came from assets that have accumulated over the past few years,
- Mission's Fund** income is from designated contributions from Church members, the sale of Food City Cash Cards, Kroger Charity Program contributions and Dimes for Missions and is used to support sixteen local charities. Mission's income for the month of March was \$372.50 (\$200.00 donation from a church member and \$172.50 from Food City Cash Cards) and the transfer of \$3,500.00 from the General Fund. Expenses were for two Mission's checks that cleared the Church account totaling \$450.00. The Difference consists of fourteen additional Mission's checks totaling \$3,050.00 that have yet to clear the Church's account and the income received via a church member donation and the Food City Cash Cards (\$3,050.00 + \$372.50 = \$3,422.50).
- Property Improvement Fund (PIF)** income is from designated donations from church members. PIF expenses are any property and facility expenses not covered by day-to-day maintenance activity. There was no activity via the PIF for the month of March.
- Pass-Thru Fund** is to account for money that comes through the Church but is not used to cover any Church expense. Pass-Thru money for the month of March consisted of income for the flower fund, men's fellowship, the library and One Great Hour of Sharing totaling \$1,175.50. Expenses were for the library, men's fellowship, and Christmas Joy totaling \$2,129.25. The Difference only shows the result of income minus expenses for the month of March. It does not indicate a negative balance within the fund itself.
- Strategic Planning Projects.** Income for the month of March consisted of an \$800.00 church member donation and the transfer of \$6,922.50 from the General Fund. Expenses were for the Fellowship Hall chair replacement project totaling \$6,922.50. This project is complete. The Difference is the income received via a church member donation.
- Transfer** is the term used to move money from one fund to another.
- Difference** = Income – Expense + Transfers

A complete picture of all the assets of the Church (Balance Sheet), 2019 Income and Expenses, and 2019 Budget Status are posted on the Church Events Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall.

2. **Agenda review and revisions:** none

4. **Treasurer's report:** The report has been placed on file for audit.
5. **Membership Report:** Jim Hansen: We have 259 members and 102 pledges for a total \$204,540.00 pledged
6. **Pastor's Report:** Pastor James: Everything is going well. Several couples are interested in joining the church. All services lined up for Easter week.
7. **Old Business:**
 - a. Review and act on final approval of each of the revised SOP's for 2019 (each Committee Liaison will review their respective SOP's and report back at the April meeting for final approval). Community Enrichment SOP needs to go to Pat and Jim. All others were approved as revised. Electronic versions of these SOP's need to be submitted to the office as soon as possible.
 - b. Any follow-up on denied request from Property & Facilities for unbudgeted funds for the installation of UV protectant film for the windows on the west side of the Sanctuary? John Zanichelli is still working on additional estimates for window tinting.
 - c. Any follow-up report for the "Committee Fair"? There are 12 committees committed to the Committee Fair on April 28th. Technology is planning on presenting a demonstration on Live streaming during Fair.
8. **New Business**
 - a. In Nancy's absence, Jim Hansen read the following: Per the recommendation of the Worship and Music Committee, Nancy Nowacki moved that the Worship and Music Committee be allowed to set up a table each Sunday in May, during Coffee Hour in the Fellowship Hall, to accept free will donations to help offset Angela Anderson's travel expenses to Germany. Marty Smith seconded the motion and the motion carried. Advertising will occur in the Sunday bulletin and local papers regarding Angela's opportunity.
 - b. Review and act on Facilities Use Permit from Sue Wilson on behalf of the "Marathon Pinochle Group" for a one time use of the Fellowship Hall and Fireside Room on either June 15th, 22nd or 29th depending on availability (Saturday – 1:30 to 4:30). Food will either be catered in or pot luck. Fred Wong moved to approve the Marathon Pinochle Group the use of Fellowship Hall and Fireside Room on June 22 or 29. Judy Moore seconded the motion and motion carried.
 - c. Review and act on Facilities Use Permit on behalf of Alex Ebneith for a fully funded dinner for all members to celebrate his 95th birthday on or around May 21st (May 24th or 25th – 5PM - 7PM). The Board felt this request was a church function and therefore supersedes non-church groups use. Dennis Flynn moved to accept the proposal by Alex Ebneith for a fully funded dinner for all members to celebrate his 95th birthday on May 21. Al Joseph seconded the motion and the motion carried. The office will let the Card Club know that the Fellowship Hall will not be available to their group on May 21st.
